From 1 to 4 October 2007, the Board of IWA convenes in Amsterdam for their annual meeting. The Board meeting will be followed by a seminar on Water and Climate, organised by the recently formed IWA Specialist Group on Water and Climate. All Board members and members of the Specialist Group are invited to attend this one-day seminar on the 5th of October, as well as NVA/KVWN members and other interested individuals.

For members of the Specialist Group the seminar is an opportunity to meet the IWA Board members from more than 50 countries. And for Board members it is an opportunity to get acquainted with and contribute to the agenda and activities of the Specialist Group.

The mission of the Specialist Group on Climate change and adaptation is to inform the members of IWA – water utility managers and water resources managers – about the outcomes of relevant research and the availability of operational tools in the field of climate variability and change. The focus will be on coping mechanisms in policy and strategy development as well as in operations.

Managing water resources under changing hydrological conditions poses a new challenge to water professionals. The assessment reports of he Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change indicate that global warming has already affected hydrological and biological systems. Obvious impacts are an increased risk of flooding, increased intensity of extreme weather events and decreased water availability in many water-scarce regions. These impacts will directly or indirectly affect both water resources and water supplies.

IWA has an active interest in Water and Climate. Recent events included the IWA conferences on climate change in Amsterdam (September 2004, 2006) and a special session during the IWA World Congress in Beijing (September 2006). These meetings addressed a wide ranging agenda of climate related issues for utilities, governments and water boards including:

- 1. The impact of climate change on water resources (quantity and quality)
- 2. Vulnerability assessments of utilities to changes in climate
- 3. Example of coping mechanisms and adaptive strategies

Based on the IWA conferences and a survey among the Specialist Group's members the management committee of the Specialist Group has drafted a Position Paper for Water and Climate.

The seminar will offer an attractive mix of presentations by water and climate specialists. Also the draft Position Paper will be presented. There will be ample time to discuss the draft and follow-up activities.

The seminar will thus be the first event of this new and much needed Specialist Group.
